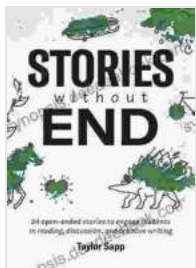


24 Open-Ended Stories to Engage Students in Reading, Discussion, and Creative Writing

A young girl writes a story. She writes about her life and her dreams. She shares her story with the world and she inspires others.

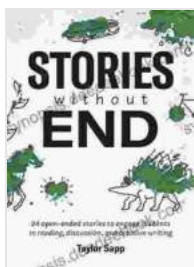
23. The Poem

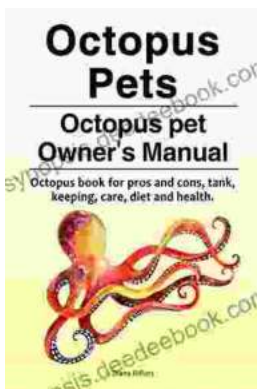


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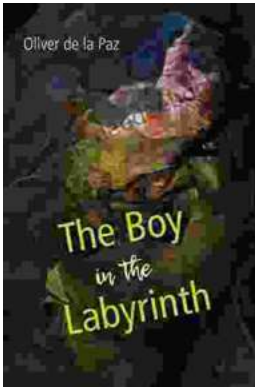
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
