challenging, but the views from the top were worth every step. We were able to see for miles in every direction, and we could even make out the Isle of Man in the distance.



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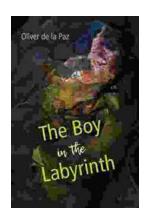
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
